October Prayer Pointers

1) Continue to pray for the Vokhul family in Nepal and specifically for the children that they have a resilience for the online schooling that has been ongoing for so long now.

2) Pray for the work of Operation Agri and specifically the two initiatives in Uganda (SAFI & WALP) which are in a state of change following the death of Paul Kyalimpa during the summer.

3) Pray for the beginnings of ministry afresh such as Toddlers in our buildings. May we as a church be able to involve ourselves with others through the words of Mother Teresa:

"It's not how much we do but how much love we put into the actions that we do".

Intercessory Prayer by Dave Mangan

Paul writes in his letter to the Romans (8:26-7)

"for we do not know how to pray as we should, but the Spirit Himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words; and He who searches the hearts knows what the mind of the Spirit is, because He intercedes for the saints according to the will of God."

One of the greatest struggles in the Christian life is prayer. So much of our interest and life is consumed by this world but we know that we must keep praying and drawing nearer to God. In the passage above, Paul says that the Spirit itself makes intercessions for us. We have all experienced times when we do not really know what to ask God for. The Holy Spirit not only knows our problems but knows perfectly the will of God. This means that sometimes God will surprise us in the answers that he gives to our prayers. He will give us something different; He gives us things when we are not expecting them; He gives us things that we would never have thought to ask for; He gives us things that the Holy Spirit sees as meeting our needs. This should give us confidence and hope that even if we cannot put into words our needs, the Holy Spirit will intercede for us. The Holy Spirit also prompts and guides us to pray for others.

Your Kingdom Come

Many people in the church will have followed the prayer course devised by Pete Greig who is the Senior Pastor of a church in Guildford and a bestselling author. His book "*how to pray*" is described as a "simple guide for normal people" and the prayer course is based on this book. In this, the first of a series of articles, we will consider the section of the course on intercessory prayer.

Intercessory prayer is described simply as presenting the needs of people to God. In 2 Chronicles 7:14 we read:

["]if my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land."

Two words in this passage stand out. **If** and **then**. **If** my people will pray, **then** I will heal their land. This is a promise from God to respond to the prayers of his people by transforming their land and forgiving their sins. When we bend our knee in prayer, God will intercede. We do not have to intercede, it is our choice to do so, but the knowledge of Jesus' heart means that we care about people and situations and bring them to God. This will release God's blessing bringing healing, reconciliation, and hope wherever we are.

The course suggests four practical steps to help us grow in our prayers for others:

- Get Informed find out the facts of the problem you are wanting to address. This may be as simple as asking someone how you can pray for them or finding out some details of an international crisis. We are encouraged to pray specifically.
- 2) Get Inspired can we see relevant promises in God's word and focus them on the person or situation. This is about praying God's prayers based on his plans and not on our own inclinations.
- 3) Get Indignant When we see the promises of God for a particular person or situation, we get annoyed by the way they are being frustrated. Robert Pierce, an American Baptist minister and the founder of the international charity organizations World Vision International and Samaritan's Purse, wrote: "Let your heart be broken with the things that break God's heart "

We are to pray holding on to the promises of God and asking that they be fulfilled.

4) Get in sync – We read in Matthews Gospel, Ch 18: 19-20

"Again, truly I tell you that if two of you on earth agree about anything they ask for, it will be done for them by my Father in heaven. For where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them."

We should pray with others and say Amen because there is a unique power in the united prayers of intercession of God's people.
