It commemorated the Presentation of the Infant Christ in the Temple and the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary, taking place - as was the custom - 40 days after the birth. The tradition spread to many Christian countries around the world.

How was Candlemas celebrated? Christmas greenery was taken out of the house. Extra candles were lit around the home, and one candle would be taken by procession to church for a blessing, a tradition still observed today by some. Special foods were eaten, and in some places still are. Pancakes and round cakes were said to represent the absent sun.



Some weather lore is associated with the day - if Candlemas is sunny and bright, there is more winter weather yet to come; but if cloudy and wet, then Spring is on its way.

The lighting of a candle reminds Christians that before Jesus, the world was in darkness, its people lost and lonely, afraid and without help. Jesus brought a message of love, hope and comfort. He is our guiding light in the darkness, the Light of the World. Surely, a truth enough to brighten the dreariness and chill of any February afternoon.

## EDUCATION, EDUCATION, EDUCATION

In 1996 new Prime Minister Tony Blair's top three priorities were "education, education, education", highlighting the significance of giving all young people the opportunity to fulfil their academic potential. We would love to see that here in Nepal, where receiving quality education has always been a challenge. Nearly 3/4 million children aged 5-12 years are out of school, and 38% of children do not complete primary school. Government funded schools often suffer from a severe lack of funding and resources, with buildings often not fit for purpose and remoteness, disability, poverty, child labour, gender and social norms all reducing a child's chance of receiving an education at all. The quality of education received is often very low with only 12% of children from the poorest families on track in literacy and numeracy.

When our own children were recently allowed back into the KISC school building they were so happy, demonstrating the significance of socializing and the high quality learning environment. The KISC **Equip** (Education Quality Improvement Program) vision is to share top teaching methods with Nepali teachers. KISC works with Nepali schools around the country to improve this objective.

Many children come to school unable to learn as they are so hungry. **Equip** staff set up a feeding program aiming to give students a proper meal at school, one of the most effective ways of improving school attendance and motivation in deprived communities.

Please *celebrate with us in prayer* the good things that are happening here for children.

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# A letter from the Treasurer

Dear Friends,

The end of the church financial year is the perfect time to review our finances. There will be no spreadsheets here, just some reflections on 2021 and thoughts about 2022.

At the beginning of 2021 we set ourselves a target for voluntary giving which, under the circumstances, was very challenging. I am pleased to be able to tell you that this target was surpassed. This achievement is a testament to the faithful, regular giving by members and friends. Even when unable to attend church because of the pandemic, people have continued to give freely in different ways. Standing orders are largely unchanged whilst other amounts are transferred directly into the church bank account on a regular basis. Packs of envelopes have been brought to church or collected by diligent staff and volunteers. As a church, we have so much to be thankful for even in these difficult times.

Other regular sources of income have been rent from Church House and government grants to cover payments to staff on furlough.

As a church, by no means have we stood still. The past year has seen progress on the heating project and refurbishment of the Welcome Hall, both major works overseen jointly by staff and church members. Other essential work to the emergency lighting and the lift has been completed. Much of this was funded from the generous legacies and gifts received prior to 2021. Our giving to Baptist and other causes has continued throughout the year.

Looking ahead to 2022, we anticipate a slow recovery in opening up our buildings. We must seek God's will in this and not expect everything to be as it was before the pandemic. The building survey undertaken last year will be used to prioritise future work. A budget has been prepared and accepted by deacons, but unfortunately the church meeting in December was not quorate so decisions about this have been deferred.

The most disappointing piece of news has come from HSBC where we bank. Until recently the church has had a Community Account which incurred no charges as long as we did not overdraw. From November, however, Community Accounts were phased out and replaced by Charitable Accounts. These will incur a monthly charge of £5.00 plus charges on all cheque and cash transactions.

In conclusion, please thank God for the faithfulness displayed by members and friends last year and, as we move forward in 2022, pray for wise stewardship and prayer-led decision making.

1 Kings 18:17-39
