Message for April from Neelam Sidhu

Jeremiah 5: 22

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"There is nothing new under the sun" Ecclesiastes 1 v9

At the end of March 2020, by government order, all places of worship were closed for normal purposes. Only activities deemed useful by government, such as food banks and blood donor sessions, were allowed to continue within churches. One London vicar railed against this in a letter to a magazine—"Blood donor sessions, but not the Blood of Christ!" "Food bank open but no Bread of Heaven!" Christians in Eastern Europe were similarly outraged when their governments had similar policies—"Not even the communists banned Easter!"

As far as England was concerned, something similar, but for very different reasons, had occurred before, in March 1208 to be precise. Due to a dispute between the Pope and England's King John, the country was placed under an Interdict or papal ruling. This was not done lightly, but was intended to put pressure on the King so as to have the Church making church appointments. All celebration of the sacraments was suspended with the exception of baptizing infants. Churches were locked, their bells went quiet, and all manner of divine services were forbidden.

King John's reaction to this was to exhibit a high degree of indifference. History records that he was not a monarch noted for his piety! Furthermore, he took the opportunity to enrich himself by diverting the revenues of church property to his own use, which resulted in him being personally excommunicated, but it didn't abate his abuses.

Eventually, in July 1214, a settlement was reached and England's spiritual life was restored to normality, no doubt to a great sigh of relief from priests and people alike.

We have not had a six year hiatus in church life, and it is, thank God, coming gradually to an end with the prospect of an unmasked normality almost in sight as I write this. Hopefully, by the time you read this, normality will be fully restored. However, as always, the Bible has it right: "There is nothing new under the sun".

I applied for the Centre Co-ordinator role in February 2016. I was offered an interview but it fell exactly on my 40th birthday when I planned to be in Malaga. It had not been possible to rearrange the interview and so I ended up working in the office of a local school.

The following year, I applied for the Premises & Church User's Co-ordinator role at MRBC in August 2017 and I was successfully employed! I recall my interview wondering if I would be able to feel at ease in this huge, old building. It was an environment far

from what I was used to. It was as though I had walked into a different age/era. I'm please to report that the building is now like my second home and I feel comfortable wandering around in the dark!

I was baptised on the first day of Spring 2012. My journey began in 2011 when I started seeking a church to attend, initially somewhere to have our children blessed and my Mum suggested Queensberry Baptist Church. I was refreshed and greatly related to the style of teaching, however, my circumstances changed on my 3rd visit when my mother died suddenly.

Even though surrounded by a loving family, my world became broken and shattered. In the midst of the pain of such loss, I grew spiritually, blessed to be in the right place. I received emotional and spiritual healing, was comforted and given inner contentment of happiness and joy as my relationship with God grew. As a child I attended many different churches and although I always had faith I did not have an active personal relationship with God.

My own personal walk and experience of bereavement has best placed me here amongst the funeral ministry of MRBC to offer guidance, advice, to empathise, affiliate and understand the walk through grief as well as serving the heart of the community. It is a privilege to be in a position placed at the forefront of the church community, supporting and working with Pastor Andy and meeting many different people from a variety of settings.

I enjoy the pace and variety of MRBC— no two days are the same!

Renew Wellbeing

Quiet shared spaces where it's OK not to be OK

Renew Wellbeing helps churches open spaces of welcome and inclusion in partnership with mental health teams to improve mental and emotional wellbeing. These spaces are designed for adults but we are also creating safe spaces for children, young people and their families (CYF).

Renew spaces are simple cafe style spaces run by local churches where hobbies and activities are shared or co-produced. Each cafe space is attached to a quiet room or prayer space where inner habits of wellbeing are shared. Each church partners with a mental health professional from the local council or other suitable organisation to ensure good inclusive practices for safe spaces where it's OK not to be OK can be sustained.

Being present • Being prayerful • Being in partnership

Renew Wellbeing provides information, inspiration, training and ongoing support to local churches as well as developing a simple national strategy for many small safe spaces to be made available through churches and councils working together.
