Message for May from our Minister

1 Corinthians 12 v12 (The Message)

You can easily enough see how this kind of thing works by looking no further than your own body. Your body has many parts—limbs, organs, cells—but no matter how many parts you can name, you're still one body. It's exactly the same with Christ. By means of his one Spirit, we all said good-bye to our partial and piecemeal lives. We each used to independently call our own shots, but then we entered into a large and integrated life in which he has the final say in everything.

Dear friend.

Easter has passed and there is much afoot in our life at as church. We looked at this passage in 1 Corinthians 12 in my March letter, but this time we are looking singly at verse 12 from The Message. In this text we read, "We each used to independently call our own shots, but then we entered into a large and integrated life in which he has the final say in everything." This writing really brings out an understanding of responsibility, which is very evident in how we express ourselves in our own lives. However, we see that it is this "own shots" responsibility which needs to be exercised in our corporate life in living as local church together.

All of us need to be seeking God in how we can be part of the body and for many of us we will find that our serving in the life of the church will itself be something that resources our ministry in the 110 hours each week as we are living in the world at large.

In the magazine there is a stewardship form to be filled in and brought back to church. Please hand it to Jean, the Church Secretary, or place it in the offering basket at the front of the worship space on a Sunday. On the form are several boxes to tick if you can offer help. If you feel that God is putting something else in your mind which is not listed, please write this in the extra box.

Certain considerations have been bubbling up amongst us and the opportunity to be part of these are invited. The Renew initiative is looking at a café-like meeting place with a focus on mental and emotional wellbeing, which is currently very much in need. Also, in a response to the cost of living and environmental concerns there has been raised the possibility of a vegetarian café for a single session a week.

been any tourists visiting during the last two years. It's been tough for them and the entire village, who over time have adapted their lifestyles to cater for the foreign tourist trade.

It's the first of April. A group of female trekkers

arrive, Pippa included, wanting to stay at Dorje's house for the night. He is delighted. As they talk the



trekkers find out that some villagers consider Dorje a fool because he and his wife recently became Christians. They and the trekkers pray together. To be considered foolish for having faith in Christ is not new. (1 Corinthians 1:18-21).

Please pray

- that the Nepali engineers at the hospital take responsibility and rise to any challenges which come their way in Toby's absence this summer
- for a successful construction phase of the new 30 bed Leprosy Ward • which Toby designed
- for Pippa's future involvement ٠

Returning to the topic of April Foolishness I would like to close with a quote associated with Jim Elliot. "He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep, to gain that which he cannot lose."

It is my prayer that you and I would increasingly align our lives with such principles, whether considered foolish or not.

For I know the Plans I have for You

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." Jeremiah 29: 11

I am really grateful to Jenny Hall. For years she has supported and taken part in the preparations for the World Day of Prayer which is a movement led by women from all around the world.

It is excellent. Each year the prayers are focussed on a different theme and written by a different country. For example, last year the theme was 'Build on a strong foundation' and was led by Vanautu (in S.W. Pacific Ocean). This year the theme was 'I know the Plans I have for You' and was jointly written by England, Wales & N. Ireland... for the first time since 1945.

The service looked at the situation of the exiled people of Israel in Jeremiah's time and explored different forms of exile in our own countries: poverty, fear and isolation.

It took the verse from Jeremiah and brought its message of hope to these situations. How God's plans for people trapped and oppressed include freedom, justice and peace.

The service used two symbols for the hope God gives - light in the form of candles and seeds with all the locked up potential they contain.

There was time for personal reflection. For example, seeds need the right conditions to grow. Where do seeds of hope need planting in your life?

There is not enough space to examine the full breadth of the World Day of Prayer Service here. However, my main desire in writing this piece is that we all make a date in our diaries for
