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Remembering

A few weeks ago, I had a meeting with Sir Mark Walport who is a member of the UK Commission on Covid Commemoration. The commission's goal is to recommend ways in which the nation can remember the loved ones who were lost, honour the heroism and skill of those who have saved lives, the courage of frontline workers who have kept our country going, and commemorate the small acts of kindness and the daily sacrifice of the millions of people who stayed at home during the pandemic.

In preparation for that meeting, I looked at different ways that people from around the world had remembered and commemorated the momentous events of the last few years. One of the most moving and powerful was Scotland's memorial. Its power lay in its simplicity. People were asked to write a sentence that started with "I remember".

People's memories and reflections covered a whole range of experiences. Many remembered the way that people's relationships with others changed or the way that they experienced the natural world in a new way. There are some that are very personal and heartfelt, most display a hope for the future and a desire to move forward without forgetting the past. The sentences inspired a series of sculptures which are now installed in a park in Glasgow.

I remember When we could see people again-everyone looked so beautiful I remember feeling so proud of my nursing Colleagues

I gave our church community an opportunity to record their memories and reflections in a similar way in the Sunday service on the 20th November. This resulted in over 80 sentences being written. It was a very humbling experience to read through people's memories and reflections. In the future I will be creating a booklet as a permanent record of our experiences.

Seen it all before

The Bible teaches us, in Ecclesiastes Ch 1 v 9: "What has been will be again, what has been done will be done again; there is nothing new under the sun."

Some of our church community can recall life in the 1970's and 1980's and were bringing up and providing for our children amidst the chaos of those times.

In Britain the annual inflation rate rose from 6.5% in 1970 to 22.7% in 1975 and did not fall below 5% until 1983. From time to time there were sudden and unpredictable shortages of basic supplies, such as salt, bread, sugar and toilet rolls.

In the autumn of 1973 Arab nations attacked the people of Israel and Israel's desperate struggle for survival was supported by help from the USA and its allies. In revenge for this help to Israel, the Arab nations quadrupled the amount they charged for oil virtually overnight. The economic damage was huge and our government's response included a drastic reduction in speed-limits on the roads, and the printing and issue of petrol-rationing coupons (although these were never actually put into use).

Another problem, the cause of which was nearer to home, were the strikes by miners, which led to lengthy periods of electricity blackouts. Coal was, in those days, the mainstay of the electricity generating industry, as well as having considerable use as domestic fuel.

Finally, as for wars near to us in Britain, there was nothing much to be concerned about except the daily knowledge that a Soviet (ie Russian) nuclear attack could reduce this country to huge deaths, casualties, and utter ruin, with only 4 minutes warning! This constant, background threat persisted to the end of the 1980's.

So, in conclusion, take two other pieces of guidance from the Bible. Firstly Matthew Ch 7 v.34: "Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough troubles of its own", and secondly Psalm 56 verses 3 & 4, but you can look that one up for yourselves.

I read about a man who was watching TV news for hours each day. He became agitated and anxious, worried that the world was falling apart and taking him with it. Perhaps we all feel like that sometimes?

What we listen to matters so much. We see this in Jesus' encounter with Pontius Pilate. Responding to criminal charges brought against Jesus by religious leaders, Pilate had summoned Him and asked, "Are you the King of the Jews?" (John 18:33).

Jesus replied with a stunning question - "Is that your own idea or did others talk to you about me?" (v 34)

The same question tests us in a world of panic. Are we listening to Christ or chaos? Indeed, Jesus said "My sheep listen to my voice. I know them and they follow me". He also said, "But they will never follow a stranger, they would run away from him because they do not recognise a stranger's voice ".

As our good shepherd Jesus bids us to hear Him above all others. May we listen well and find His peace.

How can you give more time to hearing the voice of God?
