The church's first **vision day** took place on 23rd September. We were all a little unsure of exactly what the session would involve, but fortunately our regional minister Mike Fegredo is experienced in leading such sessions, and so brought a wealth of experience and wisdom to our

discussions. After a short period of worship and prayer our discussions began.

What are we like? Around the hall Mike had placed signs with various decades written on them and we were asked to move and stand next to the sign showing the decade when we first came to MRBC. In our groupings we discussed why we had first come to MRBC, why we kept coming, what worship was like, what the focus of church was and its main activities and what were the main challenges the church faced. Mike then asked us to share some of our ideas. It was clear that the church has gone through many changes.

What is Church? Mike talked about the changing nature of churches since New Testament times. He pointed out that there has never been one set pattern for the way that churches form or the way that they function. Although churches are constantly changing however, there are always three things at their heart: worship, community, and mission.

When the new minister arrives In our small groups we were asked to complete two statements. When the new minister arrives, *they will find a church that* and *a people that* This prompted some lively discussion in our groups!

Strengths and Weaknesses After a break for coffee we tried to identify:

- Strengths - what are we really good at as a church?
- Things that need some attention - what areas of church life need working on to improve?
- Any gaps – what are we not doing at all that maybe we should think about?
- Any barriers – what's getting in the way, holding us back from moving forward in certain areas

It was surprising how many groups identified similar issues that the church will face as it moves forward.

How much change? The final activity involved discussing how much change we thought was needed in the direction of the church. A little or a lot? What will that change look like?

What are your thoughts on these questions? The final vision day is on **14th October from 10am to 1pm**. Mike will review the first session and then ask us to reflect on some more questions as we consider appointing our next minister. Please come along and share your insights.

The Church—God’s People and Possession

What is the Church? And what does it mean for us to be part of it?

The Church is the body of Christ established by God. When we hear the word Church, it’s common to have an image of a physical structure. From what we read in scripture, however, we’re compelled to think people over place, believers, instead of buildings. The Greek word translation of “Church” means “Assembly” and in most cases in the New Testament it refers to a gathering of believers in Jesus in a special location.

God’s special relationship with the plans for the Church are reflected in the words and explanation used to describe it. “You are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God’s special possession, that we may declare the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light.” *1 Peter 2:9*.

So what does this mean for how believers interact with each other? That those who belong to the family of God are to love and care for each other. As we gather together we have the privilege to “Encourage one another to show love and to do good.” *Hebrews 10: 24*. It is however something the Bible offers as a means to bear us up in faith. What a wonderful reason to seek the community of a church and to nourish one another with God’s word when we meet together in his name.

Thank God I can encourage other believers and be encouraged by them when we meet together in Jesus’ name.

The Questionable worth of Modern Ideas

In his letter to the early church of Colosse, a modest town on trade routes in those days, Paul says in verse 8 of chapter 2,

“See to it that no-one takes you captive through hollow and deceptive philosophy, which depends on human tradition and the basic principles of this world rather than on Christ.”

Paul’s purpose in writing this letter was to refute the heresy, the false and misleading ideas on faith, which some wilfully wrong-headed persons were teaching to the ‘young’ Christians of Colosse. Paul delivers, in his customary vigorous style, a crushing verdict on their teachings.

Readers will no doubt agree with me that, in our present age, we are presented with a huge choice of hollow and deceptive notions, attractively packaged to draw those looking for purpose in their lives, but who are content to ignore the living God and his risen Christ. GK Chesterton, a Christian writer of the early 20th century, commented *“When a man stops believing in God, he doesn’t then believe in nothing, he believes anything.”*

It would be possible to draw a whole lot of modern nonsense to your attention in this connection, but even a moment’s review of current worldly concerns and causes would probably bring up, firstly, the way in which a rightful concern to avoid waste and damage is beginning to move towards worship of the earth itself; and secondly, the obsession with the avoidance of certain foods, not as a choice but as an all-enveloping way of life, whose adherents would dearly like to inflict on all of us. At the risk of indulging in a mild flippancy, it would be true to say that, for some, the love of honey is the root of all evil!

One can do no better than to close by returning to Paul’s words from verses 20 and 22; *“Since you died with Christ to the basic principles of this world, why, as though you still belonged to it, do you submit to its rules? These are all destined to perish with use, because they are based on human commands and teachings.”*
