No Looking Back

During World War 1, Oswald Chambers, a Baptist evangelist and teacher, came to a crossroads in his life. Should he continue to oversee the Bible Training College he had started, or go where God was leading him to serve and support the British troops in Egypt as a YMCA chaplain?

In his daily devotional book "My Utmost for His Highest", he wrote "I give it up because I believe I do so in answer to God's call ." He never looked back. He served God selflessly for two years in Egypt, his wooden hut filled with hundreds of soldiers attending his Bible classes, until a ruptured appendix led to his death at the age of forty three.

Jesus was in Galilee when he made the "no looking back" decision to make the three day journey to Jerusalem. He set out for the city resolutely (Luke 9:5) knowing that opposition from the Samaritans, who were hostile to Jews, would make it a difficult trek to the city where He would ultimately be crucified on a cross. His mission to provide salvation for all who would believe in Him had to be accomplished (Romans 3:25-26). As He made his way along the dusty road Jesus called out to a man "come, follow me" (Luke 9:59).

He says the same to you and me today, and the decision to follow Him is the most important we will make, for it leads to eternal life. Without it we're destined to eternal suffering (Matt.16:25). Jesus said we must leave everything behind to follow Him. "Anyone who puts his hand to the plough and then looks back is not fit for the Kingdom of God." (Luke 9:62)

Let us follow Him today and not look back.

Rev Dr Brian Haymes

Former Minister at MRBC

The Baptist Times has recorded the death at the age of 84 of Brian Haymes, who became minister here in 1977.

Brian came to us following his ministry at South Street Baptist Church, Exeter, and settled into the manse with his wife Jenni and two daughters. However, it was to be only a short ministry as in 1980 he accepted the position of Tutor at Northern Baptist College, Manchester. He later became Principal of the college, and then Principal of Bristol Baptist College. (Whilst there he was appointed Baptist Union President for 1993). There followed a return to church ministry, this time at Bloomsbury Baptist Church in London, where he remained until his retirement. He and Jenni returned to Manchester, and then to Crewe where he died suddenly in July.

The Baptist Times article included many warm tributes from a wide variety of people whose lives were touched by Brian Haymes. If anyone who remembers him would like to read them they can be found online, or I would be happy to print a copy for you.

TIMES AND SEASONS



Ecclesiastes 3:1 "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens"

We used the above verse as a heading for our talk this summer, reflected back on 6½ years of service in Nepal, and also stated our willingness to return to the country to face new challenges.

We have been encouraged by the feedback from Nepali Christians about impact, the teamwork between our supporters in the UK, BMS as an organisation, and the overseas worker, but also by the message that every Christian has a place in God's history, and that He desires mine and your attention at times of decision making and change.

Coming to the end of our service with BMS, we want to share a few insights emerging from the time abroad:

* Given the extent to which Christianity has evolved over centuries for the Western world, it is amazing to see how far the Nepali church has come in just three generations (since the gospel was preached in Nepal). When the Holy Spirit is at work in a country and a population, amazing things happen.

* I see the need for local ownership, for participatory and emancipatory processes to grow in relation to Global South communities, and sense that Western Christians who are prepared to work with cultural sensitivity, have a role to play by being placed for a time within the Global South.

* Life is harsh for vast populations in South Asia, and the value of a human life and gender equality for example is not as embedded in other religions as it is in our faith. This faith based motivation can, and should, find expression in social action and deeds of love by the Christian community in the Global South.

I want to thank you for walking this particular journey from Oxford to Nepal with us as a family. We want to testify that we serve a faithful God, and he has not let us down. A new chapter is starting as we are joining Interserve GBI to assist Nepali Christians with efforts to bring hope and healing to young Nepalis who have been trafficked into prostitution at a young age, and who need to know the love which our Saviour has for them.

As I close, I would like to re-connect with the verse from Ecclesiastes: '*There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens*'. God, throughout history, commits to the human element. He uses feeble and failing humans, who are willing to learn obedience and let Him plug their gaps, to play their part in His plans within a generation. God's calling is not just for the experts, for the professionals, it is for me and for you. Are you prepared for new times and seasons and maybe surprising events which can unfold when you give the Almighty free reign with your life and your future?

- A man's wisdom gives him patience; it is to his glory to overlook an offence. (19 v11)
- Better a patient man than a warrior, a man who controls his temper than one who takes a city. (16 v32)
