Message for February from Jennifer Maxwell "Love Others"

What does it mean to Love Others? MRBC mission statement – Love Jesus, Love Others, Make Disciples.

I asked myself that question during Thursday morning Reflective Prayer meeting. I asked one of the Deacons, he said pray for others. But somehow I still felt that there was more that was needed to "Love Others". The following incident has made me think even more about what it means to Love Others; how am I doing that? How is my church showing Love for Others?

On the Sunday morning after the prayer meeting, I saw a person wrapped in various clothes sleeping in the church garden adjacent to Gregory Boulevard. He wasn't moving. As I stood there wondering is the person alive? What should I do? A fellow church member joined me and we talked about the person lying there. What should we do? We went into church.

My mind was uneasy and I spoke to the greeters Clive and Diane. We asked ourselves what can we do? Who can help this person? Maybe the emergency services could give us advice? Diane had taken him a cup of tea, he had moved his head, so he was alive. We were both concerned and decided to go and check on him.

We stooped down and looked under the soiled quilts and blankets and saw a man's face. He wasn't moving. I said "hello" a few times and "My name is Jennifer, what's your name". He looked up, smiled and said my name is "Lee". We reassured him we weren't moving him on, just concerned that he was OK. He told us a little about himself and why he wasn't in a hostel – he had too many belongings in the shopping trolley next to him. We left and went into church. He was still there after church. Later Diane messaged that she contacted the Council's Outreach Team and they would send someone out to see Lee.

I'm left wondering if I could have done more for Lee. If we are called to Love Others, should we be looking at how we put this into action?

The above brought to mind an Andy Bruce sermon many years ago. He preached about Christians dressed for church walking past people in need on the street because they didn't want to be late for church or get involved, especially if the person looked unkempt or dirty. I wonder if the reason is that we don't know what to do when faced with some situations. Is Lee sleeping outside our church a signal that we need to consider how the church shows our Love for Others?

A few thoughts to take into the New Year

During last autumn I came across a small item in our weekly newspaper. It concerned some academic study that had been carried out on matters of social attitudes and world values. After this three-year study of Britain and five other countries, the research team concluded that religious beliefs in Britain had changed much between 2008 and 2018, with the later date showing that only 35% of the population believed in God. The research team also found that the previously widely held idea that atheists' and agnostics' lives lacked meaning and morality is no longer true. Apparently, many atheists and agnostics endorse objective moral values, human dignity and rights, and see family centred values as important for finding meaning in the world. These are hardly startling revelations, of course, but perhaps a deeper examination of this would be helpful.

We should of course ground *our* lives as Christians in deep foundations of scriptural truth. Accordingly, let us see what the apostle Paul has to say in his letters. In the first letter to the Corinthians, Ch 1, v 20, he says "Where is the wise man? Where is the scholar? Where is the philosopher of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world?" In the letter to the Colossians, Ch 2, v 8 he admonishes the readers: "See to it that no-one takes you captive through hollow & deceptive philosophy, which depends on human tradition and the basic principles of this world rather than on Christ."

A fairly recent convert to Christianity has written: "Our most important ideas—freedom of conscience, the presumption of innocence, and forgiveness—are Christian principles and innovations." It is also true to say that the greatest innovation of Christianity was to show that all of us, Jew or gentile, were made in the image of God and could aspire to salvation. Opposed to Christianity, and make no mistake it *is* opposed to Christianity, secular humanism is hollow and deceptive. It encourages people to dissolve the bonds of family and faith in favour of freedom, and to consume and seek pleasure without responsibilities. It all too quickly, and all too obviously, becomes hedonism, nihilism and misery.

It is hardly necessary for me to elaborate any further; a brief review of modern life, as it is conventionally lived by so many people, will convince you, if you are not already convinced, of the truth of this.

However, to conclude on a positive note, followers of Jesus Christ in every age have clung to a simple truth that, though often repeated, still carries a powerful message: **we may not know what the future holds**, **but we know who holds the future.**
