Message for April from Hazel O'Connor

The Cross

Jesus said, *"Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they do."* (Luke 23:34).

Today, crosses are worn by some believers and it is common to see crosses on steeples and inside churches as a symbol of Christianity. But in the 1st century the sight of a cross would draw gasps of horror. Crucifixion was reserved for the worst criminals, who were nailed there until they died from asphyxiation (suffocation), which could take several days. It was so horrible that no Roman citizens could be condemned to such a death.

Yet the sinless Jesus was led to a cross to die. The women cried, the religious leaders scoffed, onlookers watched. The Roman soldiers gambled. Thieves hanging either side of Jesus faced the same death. The rulers said sneeringly "*He saved others, let him save himself.*" (23:35). One of the thieves who was being crucified with Him recognised that He should not be crucified and said to Him "*remember me when you come into your kingdom.*" (23:42). Despite His unbearable pain, Jesus told this repentant thief "*I assure you you, today you will be with me in paradise.*" (23:43). And it was then that He prayed to his Father asking forgiveness for all those who were there at the cross. The repentant thief benefited from prayer, admitting his sin and receiving God's forgiveness.

Whether or not we wear a cross round our neck or display one in our home to show that we're Christian doesn't matter. What matters is our relationship with Jesus. He is the only one who can save us. Reflect on God's love in sending Jesus to the cross for you.

Who have you found difficult to forgive? Why not give them a call today?

1. Replay - think over your day like a film replaying in your head. What made you happy? – What made you anxious? What made you angry?

2. Rejoice - thank God for all the good things that have happened in your day. Savour these moments in gratitude to God.

3. Repent - say sorry to God for moments that come into your mind as you review the day. Receive His forgiveness afresh.

4. Reboot – make a decision in your heart to live for Jesus tomorrow and ask for grace to see His presence more clearly.

The Purpose of the Biblical Proverbs

Over the last few months, a selection of verses from the biblical Proverbs has been put forward in this church magazine. The themes so far have been: Diplomacy in Practice; Home Life; and Politics and Government. There may be more to follow.

You may be asking what the purpose is of these biblical proverbs, after all, they are not the words spoken by Jesus in the time of his earthly ministry, and they are not the guidance of Paul and his helpers in spreading the teachings of Jesus to the wider world.

The opening verses of Proverbs say it all, and one set out below, verses 2 to 7 of the Prologue.

For attaining wisdom and discipline; for understanding words of insight; for acquiring a disciplined and prudent life, doing what is right and just and fair; for giving prudence to the simple, knowledge and discretion to the young—let the wise listen and add to their learning, and let the discerning get guidance for understanding proverbs and parables, the saying and riddles of the wise.

The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge, but fools despise wisdom and discipline.

No-one could put it more plainly than that.

Thank you to **Michael Blissett** for giving us another cutting he saved from The Times newspaper, August 10th 2019, from their weekly article "Faith Register". This one is by Jewish rabbi and author Dr Jonathan Romain, entitled

Becoming better versions of ourselves is reincarnation

Dr Romain begins by suggesting that today more people seem to be aware of the concept of reincarnation than was once the case. He acknowledges that it is key to several other faiths, and suggests that many of us live in multi-cultural, multi-faith societies and may, therefore, be familiar with it. He writes:

The concept of reincarnation is as alien to Judaism as it is to Christianity, and it is nowhere to be found in the Bible. However, this has not stopped some rabbis suggesting that reincarnation is a punishment for misdemeanours that must be rectified until spiritual perfection is achieved.

But it leads us to ask if this is the way of a loving God, and also would mean that we lack free will. Mainstream Judaism concentrates instead on how we behave in *this* world, offering routes to immortality through what we do in the here and now. Our influence also lives on if those who knew us act in a certain way because of us, or see the world through a lens that we helped to shape.

Good deeds also survive after us through the charities we supported, the people we mentored, the ventures we helped and the individuals to whom we offered a kind word when they were in need.

He mentions an occasion when he asked some elderly people what they might do differently if they had the chance, reporting:

Some said they would take more risks and come out of their comfort zone, others would make different choices, or perhaps live each day as if it were their last and live it more joyously.

The rabbi concludes: This is where religion can make a difference. It challenges people while they are still alive to adopt alternatives, rise above ruts and become a better version of themselves. Whether it be changing our jobs, relationships or personal conduct, it is far better to assume that there is only one life and that we have to make the best of it. Who needs reincarnation when we can renew ourselves in this life?

Tell it not in Gath, proclaim it not in the streets of..... (2 Samuel 1:20)

This concerns our two new linked-missionary teams. In both cases they are a married couple, and in both cases they are working in or into very difficult and dangerous countries. In one case the work involves

broadcast and social media targeting of North Africa, and in the other, actually living in a Central Asian country working for a specialised hospital.

The dreadful extent of persecution of Christians in North Africa and that other place cannot be exaggerated, and there is a very real risk to these good people were they to be identified and exposed to Christ's enemies. Accordingly, there will be no material displayed in church or in the magazine that could be misused in any way. The full BMS guidance on confidentiality covers both sides of an A4 paper!

However, to keep it simple as well as secure, our BMS friends best support is in our prayers, and for this purpose I suggest that prayers are made for "Peter and Paul" and "Saul and Barnabas". God knows his own, and will act as needed.

If a few people would like a copy of the confidential updates that will be sent to me from time to time by BMS, these could be supplied by prior request, and under promises of confidentiality.
